Anticipation of Thanksgiving and gathering with family and friends for the annual feast. It's invigorating to see your breath in the morning for the first time. 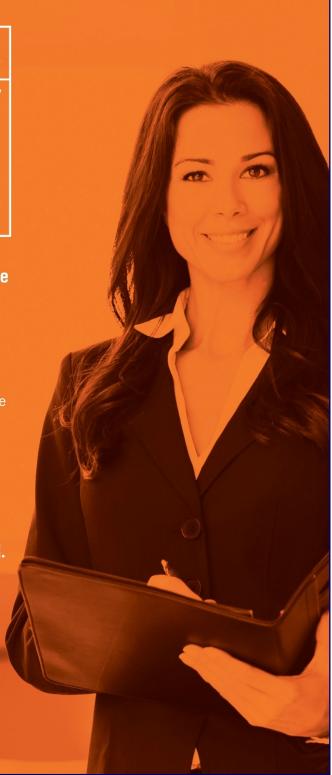

# SEPTEMBER CLE RECAP The Limited License Legal Technician Presented by: Valerie A. Wilus, RP, Pa.C.P.

The Lansdale School of Business located in North Wales, Pennsylvania hosted the Montgomery County Paralegal Association's September CLE, The Limited License Legal Technician. The Lansdale School of Business was a great venue for this CLE as the LSB focuses on paralegals and are committed to the advancement of their students in this profession. MCPA members and students of the LSB joined Valerie A. Wilus, a Civil Litigation Paralegal, for this informative and educational CLE. Valerie Wilus works as a paralegal for Hangley Aronchick Segal Pudlin & Schiller. Valerie has worked as a paralegal with two other firms, most notably, Dolchin, Slotkin & Todd, P.C., specializing in estate planning, estate administration, corporate, immigration, personal injury, medical malpractice, legal malpractice, commercial litigation and contracts. Valerie currently serves as President of the National Federation of Paralegal Associations and has previously served as President, and other Board member positions, of the Philadelphia Association of Paralegals and as Chairperson of the Keystone Alliance of Paralegal Associations. Valerie has served as past Chair of the Regulation Ad Hoc Committee of the Keystone Alliance that developed the Pennsylvania Certified Paralegal Program that is currently offered to the Paralegals throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Valerie has received many honors over the years, including, but not limited to the NFPA Outstanding Local Leadership Award in October 2007. Valerie has often written articles for both The Forum and the Legal Intelligencer and one of her articles,



entitled "Should Disbarred or Suspended Attorneys Be Allowed to Work as Paralegals?", has generated numerous comments and even a responsive article by the Philadelphia Bar Association.

Valerie obtained her RP designation on June 1, 2004 and obtained her Pa.C.P., designation on March 13, 2009. Her achievements in the paralegal profession serves as a valuable resource for all paralegals and the MCPA was proud to have her present this CLE to our members and paralegal students.

Valerie's topic this evening was on the Limited License Legal Technician (LLLT). The LLLT is not a fully licensed lawyer, but someone that is licensed to assist clients short of representing clients in court in certain legal matters. The LLLT is a person qualified by education, training and work experience who is authorized to engage in the limited practice of law in approved practice areas of law as specified by this rule and related regulations. The legal technician does not represent the client in court proceedings or negotiations, but provides limited legal assistance.

Washington State is the first and only state to offer affordable legal support to help those who meet the needs of those unable to afford the legal services of an attorney.

This authorization for the LLLT comes from the Supreme Court of Washington and a 13 member appointed board appointed by the Supreme Court of Washington. The board consists of a legal educator, Washington lawyers and Washington non-lawyer residents. The board determines CLE requirements and education requirements as well as setting fees for licensure. The board also sets rules and regulations that establish ethical conduct as well as a process for grievances or disciplinary action.

The authorization for the LLLT allows these technicians to advise clients in the area of family law, obtain relevant facts, inform clients about possible implications of the law as it pertains to their case, perform legal research to answer questions, draft legal documents to be filed with the court, and advise clients on how to manage their legal actions.

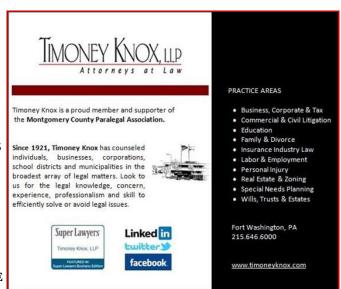
The requirements to become a LLLT are the following:

- Obtain an Associate's Degree or higher
- Complete 45 credit hours of core curriculum through a legal program approved by the ABA or the LLLT Board
- Complete applicable practice area courses through the University of Washington School of Law
- Complete 3,000 hours of paralegal experience involving substantive legal work in any practice area under the supervision of an attorney
- Pass the Practice Area and Professional Responsibility Exams
- Fulfill other licensing requirements

For those who have worked in the paralegal profession understand that this is a very important step for paralegals and for those who are in need of legal assistance but cannot afford an attorney. Although other states have their own certification programs as well as national organizations such as the National Federation of Paralegal Association that offers regulation, no other state has this program that utilizes paralegals in this capacity or provides for this authorization.

The ABA is working on the future of legal services and conducting a series of grassroots meetings and

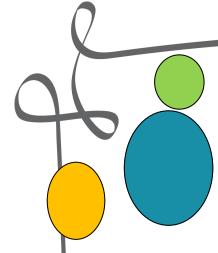

national convocations designed to encourage bar leaders, judges, court personnel, businesses, clients, technologists, and innovators to share their vision for more efficient and effective ways to deliver legal services.

If you are reading this and are a paralegal who is not certified or registered, this is the time to think about getting out there and doing more for yourself and your career. It may be a long time before other states jump on the bandwagon for the LLLT, but as a paralegal with more credentials under your belt you open yourself to educate employers about the experience, knowledge and accolades you have earned. These certifications or registrations that are awarded to you demonstrate you hold yourself to a higher standard and are committed to upholding the ethical standard of the paralegal profession. A paralegal career can be much more than you realize and can give you opportunities that you may not have known existed. Check out your local paralegal organizations and get involved. There is more education and support that awaits you and that can only build your resume. Washington may be the first state to authorize the LLLT but Pennsylvania and other states have committees, boards, and other paralegal organizations that need the support of other paralegals to keep this profession growing.

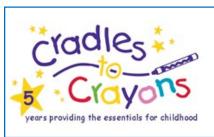

### OCTOBER CLE RECAP Collaborative Family Law

Attorney Peter Bort presented COLLABORATIVE PRACTICE: A BETTER WAY TO APPROACH CONFLICT RESOLUTION

Mr. Bort presented the different types of conflict resolution as follows:

- 1. **Arbitration** where two parties in conflict will meet with an Arbitrator (who is often a retired judge or long time attorney). The resolution is binding and even more so than a court decision because there is no Superior Court to answer to.
- 2. **Mediation** this is non-binding where two parties meet with a mediator one or more times to discuss the matter and come up with compromises. The Mediator can write up a memorandum but this is not binding. An attorney is required to create an Agreement and file it in court. The parties themselves are unrepresented so this won't be effective if one party is in anyway reticent or hesitant to speak up for themselves.
- 3. **Litigation** this is the process most people are familiar with. Each party has an attorney and the attorneys communicate to each other the parties' stance. The communication goes from party 1 to attorney 1 to attorney 2 to party 2 and back and forth. Hearings are scheduled and decisions can be complicated.
- 4. "Kitchen Table" matters where two parties agree on an issue but need legal help to make it binding some people getting a divorce might say "we both had the same attorney". This is because they had made their decisions and just needed to have someone legalize (file the papers.) This "both had the same attorney" is misleading because by ethics an attorney always represents one side. So really the plaintiff had the attorney and the defendant just cooperated.
- 5. **Collaborative** this is the process where each party has an attorney and they all meet together with a collaborative coach. The coach is neutral and acts as a facilitator, each party has an advocate (their attorney) and every gets an equal say. There is an agenda and copious notes are taken to document the decisions made. And the communications take place with everyone right there reducing misinterpretation.

  Minutes of each meeting of the parties will be taken by the coach or the attorney.

Informal discovery will usually be requested by the "financial neutral".

#### The Collaborative Process.

A Retainer Letter is signed which lists the conditions and boundaries for the relationship.

A Collaborative Agreement is signed by the attorneys and the parties. The Agreement states that this relationship only exists as long as no one litigates actions in court.

Once someone wants to litigate both parties must obtain new attorneys. This puts skin in the game – it's not easy to go confrontational once you've agreed to try collaborative – but it's not unheard of. Mr. Bort has had 26 collaborative cases and only one went to litigation and the parties got new attorneys.

The parties determine what their main goals are (i.e. to be financially secure, to make the process easy on the children...) and the group finds other neutral parties to help called financial neutrals – a CPA type person who can help sort out financial information but who does not care about the outcome.

Collaborative practice is not therapy – the parties are encouraged to keep on with current therapists – collaborative practice is a means to a peaceful decision-making process.

Collaborative practice can be used in many areas of law, Elder law, real estate matters. Bort Law make use of this method mostly in family law so most of his examples had to do with divorce matters.

This method of agreement can take anywhere from one meeting to several meetings. During this process one of the attorneys may file the Divorce complaint which does not affect the process at all – it just puts a stake in the ground.

Collaborative practice is the process that's most likely to encourage reconciliation. Mr. Bort said that one of his recent cases reconciled.

Collaborative practice enables everyone to feel heard and represented. It's more of a win-win outcome.

Modifications of any agreements will result in a new Retainer Letter.

There is training for collaborative attorneys and also practice groups which are local groups with regular meetings to discuss collaborative law. Not just anyone can be a collaborative attorney. 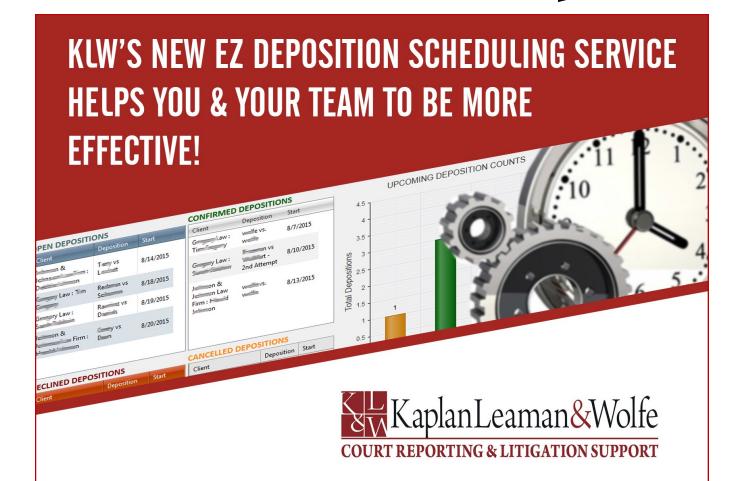

### **Adobe Acrobat Pro**

Adobe Acrobat

Have you ever been asked to send a document electronically but must first remove sensitive information by going through the entire document with a black marking pen? Well there is an easier and more professional way to do that! Here's how:

- ⇒ Choose Tools > Protection
- $\Rightarrow$  Do one of the following:
  - Mark for redaction. This will allow you to go through the document and mark anything that you want to redact; or
  - Search and remove text. This allows you to search certain words or phrases in the entire document and then redact all of them at one time.
- ⇒ After choosing one of the above, choose "apply redactions".

You now have a redacted document to send!

#### **Word Shortcuts:**

Shift + F5 Returns to the last edit point. Very useful when you have to copy some text from other parts of the document and you want to return to where you were in order to paste it.

Shift + F3 (Changes the case of any selected text). This shortcut is useful when you want to toggle through the capitalization options. If you have a few lines of text in all uppercase and you want it to be in lowercase then this shortcut should make your life easier.

 $\mathcal{F}$  Ctrl + F (Opens the Find tab). Use this shortcut to open the find tab when you want to search for text. Ctrl + H will find and replace.

Other quick text formatting keystrokes:

<u>Ctrl+B</u> to make bold <u>Ctrl+I</u> to make italic <u>Ctrl+U</u> to underline <u>Ctrl+L</u> to left-justify text <u>Ctrl+E</u> to center <u>Ctrl+J</u> to justify <u>Ctrl+R</u> to right-justify
